MA eBook Project Evaluation

Presented for review by the Statewide Resource Sharing Committee - June 12, 2014

Background

In September 2012, the Statewide Resource Sharing Committee (SRSC) created a business plan that outlined a vision and principles for a statewide eBook program and recommended a pilot project to explore solutions and develop recommendations for statewide implementation. This report outlines the pilot project and provides an evaluation of the project and recommendations for expansion to all libraries in the Commonwealth.

Pilot Libraries

SRSC identified five "alpha" libraries who each selected nine additional libraries for the pilot program. There were also a few changes midstream. In the end, 49 libraries of all types throughout Massachusetts participated in the pilot project.

eBook Products

Three vendors were selected from an RFP process to provide content and functionality for this pilot project. As of May, there are 164,351 eBooks and other digital items available for download/circulation.

All content from the three products was added to the MA eBook Project catalog (http://ebooks.masslibsystem.org/) maintained by MLS and hosted by Bywater Solutions. In total, 162,823 records for eBooks and other eContent are currently available in the system for pilot library users.

SRSC developed three broad evaluation criteria for the pilot project shown below.

- 1. MLS and the pilot libraries have engaged actively with the three vendors in the pilot program to identify enhancements and to address challenges with each platform. In general, the vendors have been very receptive to those efforts and have made many changes to incorporate our feedback. There are, however, challenges that remain such as a more seamless authentication process, and it is our hope to work with our vendor partners on ongoing improvements. There are surveys in progress to gather feedback from library staff and users.
- 2. Pilot libraries have access to more than 150,000 titles in the collection.
- 3. The PR, Promotion and Training Task Force developed a launch kit, promotional materials and documentation for the products in the pilot project. Vendors, task force members and other pilot library staff members offered numerous training opportunities for interested pilot library staff members.

Usage Statistics

Below are the download/circulation statistics from the three products in the pilot project. These statistics reflect varying launch times and intensive training times throughout the pilot project, so it is premature to extract meaning. However, it does appear that use is on the rise for all products, and we now have baseline data that can be used to monitor progress in the longer term.

Successes

- One of the greatest successes of this project was the engagement of the pilot libraries with the project and with one another. This project was a great example of multi-type library collaboration. In addition, the three task forces were very productive during the pilot program, laying the groundwork for the future. In short, this was a participant-driven project.
- 2. Another great success is our engagement with our vendor partners. In particular, Baker & Taylor and BiblioLabs have been very responsive to suggestions, very active in our training efforts and also very active in their efforts with publishers on our behalf.
- 3. Advocacy has been another important component of the project. The pilot libraries were engaged with the legislative agenda, and Baker & Taylor successfully expanded access to publishers that were previously unable to libraries in consortia. In addition, MLS expanded its collaboration with other major U.S. consortia including a shared booth at Book Expo America to promote cooperation between libraries and publishers.

Lessons Learned

- 1. Contract negotiations and other critical items took longer than expected, pushing back the time frame considerably. Some pilot libraries were fatigued by the drawn out project, and scheduling became challenging as the launch of the pilot project faced the different calendars in play, such as the school year and the academic calendar.
- Because it is a pilot project, there were often just a few staff members at each library that were engaged. This likely slowed implementation and use of the products. However, this is to be expected in a pilot project.
- 3. The process of pilot library selection focused on library type, but didn't factor in the networks and geographies of the state. This has led to some misunderstandings and perceived inequity.
- 4. Authentication is currently not optimal, and we continue to work with the vendors on a scalable approach. (Note, however, that the networks have been very cooperative in handling authentication needs for their pilot libraries.)

Sustainability and Funding Recommendations

Governance

We recommend that this project continue as an ongoing statewide program with the Massachusetts Library System and the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners providing funding for infrastructure, support, and, if possible, for content. A memorandum of understanding outlining the roles and responsibilities of all stakeholders will provide a roadmap to success. We further recommend the establishment of a steering committee, referred to herein as the eContent Program Steering Committee, comprised of participating libraries that shall govern the program in concert with the Resource Sharing Team at MLS.

Vendors

We recommend that the project launch with the three vendors used in the pilot project as outlined below. Additional vendors may be added driven by participant demand and as funding allows.

Baker & Taylor: Axis 360

In anticipation of the launch of this project, MLS has negotiated the following terms that outline progressive pricing as participation in the eContent Program expands.

Baker & Taylor content is available via the one-book-one-user model, and they have committed to work with us on content portability should we decide to move content we have purchased to another platform, within the rights of the publishers.

BiblioLabs: BiblioBoard Library and Creator

BiblioBoard content is available via the unlimited simultaneous use model and can be available via geolocation.

Proquest: EBook Library (EBL)

There are no platform fees or content minimums associated with this contract. Content is available to purchase and via short-term loan. Purchased content is available via EBL's horizontal lending program that sets a number of lends per title each year and allows for simultaneous use. Short-term loan content is available as pay-per-use. The eContent Program Steering Committee can designate which content is available via short-term loan, gaining control over potential costs.

Public Relations

The pilot project PR Task Force was actively engaged with MBLC's PR committee. This is an integral part of the success of a statewide project building a strong presence and unified look. It is recommended that this close relationship continue.

Funding Model

The following funding model provides a sustainable beginning for the project. The steering committee will evaluate adjustment needs in subsequent years.

The contribution for academic libraries is based on materials budget as taken from IPEDS data. The contributions for public libraries are based on population served reported to MBLC and are graduated by EQV per capita provided by the Department of Revenue for those municipalities that fall below the median. The contributions for school libraries are based on student FTE reported to the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education and are also graduated by EQV per capita for those municipalities that fall below the median. Special libraries are not included in this fee structure as their purposes and collection needs vary greatly. We anticipate approaching them by sub-type and group (e.g. MAHSLIN) on major collection purchases to gain entry to the program.

Incentives for participation include the following:

- Year 1 entry low pricing
- MLS and MBLC cover all platform fees
- Discount to groups
- Year 1 priority setting and policy development

The Year 1 **group discount** would be as follows:

 Up to a 25% discount for large groups with a minimum of 10 participating members If not every member of the group participates, the discount will be adjusted proportionally by the percentage of members joining.

FY 2015 Priorities

There are a number of important efforts that we expect to begin or continue in FY 2015 in order to ensure a successful program.

5. Continued strong participant engagement

The Steering Committee will evaluate and make recommendations for the future success of the statewide program. Nora Blake, MLS MassCat Manager, will join the Resource Sharing Team and work with participant libraries on support and training. MLS Technical Advisors and support staff will work to develop an efficient support and system to allow the widest possible participation by libraries and patrons.

6. Continued strong vendor engagement

Stephen Spohn at MLS will work with vendor partners on ongoing technical improvements and publisher relations.

7. Establishment of steering committee and content selection processes
The Collection Development Task Force has laid a strong foundation for content selection.

8. Continued collaboration with MBLC to define roles and promote to libraries and patrons

The PR, Promotion & Training Task Force, in collaboration with Celeste Bruno at MBLC, has established priorities with MBLC and Buyer Advertising to continue working on a strong message and materials for library staff and end-users.

9. Continued dialog with Library for the Commonwealth

10. Stronger engagement with our network partners

We hope to engage them in conversations with vendors to help develop smarter authentication frameworks, workflows for metadata and related support issues.

11. Continued exploration of eBook discovery solutions

MLS is active on the Statewide Discovery Task Force and is also actively exploring emerging eBook platform and discovery solutions in the marketplace.
